THE MUNICH COWBOYS



The Munich Cowboys history dates back to 1975 when a group of local athletes met to play members of the U.S. Army. In 1979 the Cowboys became one of the founding members of the American Football Bundesliga, which became known later as the German Football League. Other founding members with the Frankfurt Lowen, Dusseldorf Panthers, Ansbach Grizzlies, Berlin Bears and Bremerhaven Seahawks. The Munich Cowboys, along with the Dusseldorf Panthers, have the longest history of any other teams in the GFL.

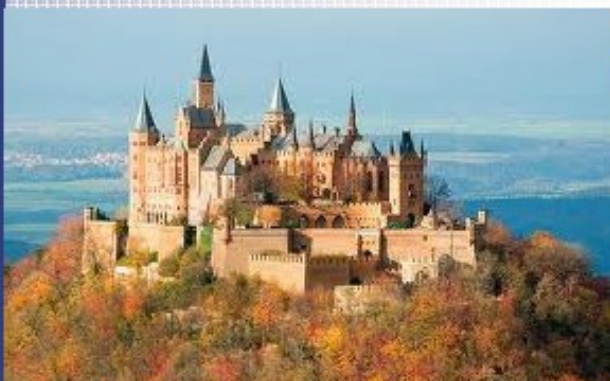
The Cowboys have made only one appearance in the German Football League National Championship, in 1992. They are known as one of the most competitive teams in all of Europe.

THE USA EAGLES FOOTBALL CLUB



Celebrating the Team's Tenth Anniversary of competitive excellence, The USA Eagles Football Club has provided more than 350 athletes and coaches post-collegiate playing opportunities in nine countries and nearly 30 total games and events. The Eagles have played only one other game in Germany when they met the Stuttgart Scorpions in April 2004. It was a very hard fought battle and the Eagles came out on top by a score of 27–10.

STUTTART, GERMANY



Stuttgart is the capital of Baden-Württemberg, Germany, with a population of more than 2.6 million people in the metropolitan area.

Stuttgart was founded in the 10th century; its name is a modern version of the original Stutengarten ("mare's garden"). Presently it is the 6th largest city in Germany. It is most famous for its automotive industry - both Porsche and Mercedes-Benz have their headquarters in Stuttgart and both have car museums.

Stuttgart has a number of first-rate art collections and two museums that are sure to set the pulse of the motor-minded racing. Blessed with an air of relaxed prosperity and a keen sense of style, the city is one of the greenest in Europe - not only is it well-endowed with parks, but it even has its own vineyards! The shopping, restaurant, cultural and night-life scenes are all vibrant.

Stuttgarters are amazingly friendly people who will forgive you if German isn't your first or second (or any) language. If you do speak German well: beware that many people speak the local *Schwäbisch* dialect natively which may somewhat effect their standard German - which however everyone can speak. They love to practice other languages (especially English) and will try to help you. Stuttgart is a big city with a small-town atmosphere.

Finally, Stuttgart is the home to the United States Army Garrison (USAG) who will play host to the USA Eagles during our stay. The military community at Stuttgart has a total community of about 10,800 and is host to the United States European Command (EUCOM) and U.S. Special Operations Command Europe.





Munich (German: *München*) [1] is the capital city of Bavaria. Within the city limits, Munich has a population of more than 1.3 million, making it the third most populous city in Germany. Greater Munich including its suburbs has a population of 2.6 million. The Munich metropolitan region which extends to cities like Augsburg or Ingolstadt had a population of more than 5.6 million in 2008.



Munich, located at the river Isar in the south of Bavaria, is famous for its beautiful architecture, fine culture, and the annual *Oktoberfest* beer celebration. Munich's cultural scene is second to none in Germany, with the museums even considered by some to outrank Berlin in quality. Many travelers to Munich are absolutely stunned by the quality of the architecture. Although it was heavily damaged by allied bombing during World War II, many of its historic buildings have been rebuilt and the city center appears mostly as it did in the late 1800s including its largest church, the *Frauenkirche*, and the famous city hall (*Neues Rathaus*).



Munich can be consistently found in the top tier of quality-of-life-rankings of world cities. *Monocle* magazine even named it the world's most livable city in 2010. When Germans are polled about where they would most like to live, Munich finds its way consistently at the top of the list. Within proximity of the Alps, and some of the most beautiful scenery in Europe, it's not surprising that everyone wants to live here. Add to its benefit the beautiful architecture, especially Baroque and Rococo, green countryside which starts a mere half hour away on the *S-Bahn*, a beautiful park called *Englischer Garten*, two of the best universities in Germany, a booming economy with global headquarters of many world-class companies, modern infrastructure and the greatest beer culture on the planet.
